Overwhelming demand brings Donna Prime, Roger Vandiver, Kim Wertenberger and Juanda Krebs out of retirement!!!

Joined by a solid and growing volunteer base Wags To Riches Animal Rescue and Sanctuary, Inc. was established to help meet the needs of the animals.

On the streets of every town in every community or countryside you will see them....the lost abused and abandoned. They are sick, hungry, injured. They are searching for someone to feed them, love them and take them home. They want a place to feel secure and safe. WHAT OUR FUTURE LOOKS LIKE

Wags to Riches has an ambitious plan for the future.

That plan includes a Sanctuary for animals that are unadoptable, a place where they can live out their lives without fear of desertion, starvation or euthanasia, a place where they will be loved and kept warm. There will, sadly, always be some animals that we can't save but the guidelines will be very clear. Vicious/aggressive (that may hurt someone), injured (in a great deal of pain due to serious injury, as determined by the vet), or animals in very poor health (too sick, as determined by the vet, and would be inhumane to keep them alive) will be humanely put to sleep.

In addition, we have established the Merlin Scholarship Fund, in honor of Prince Merlin, to be used for students who want to go to school to study Veterinary Medicine.

Our education programs are in the beginning stages, with volunteers consisting of students and adults. We are excited about these programs that will educate children about a variety of things dealing with animals including how to be respectful to animals and educate adults about Spay and Neuter. The facts are astounding. An animal is **euthanized every 16 seconds.** We are a part of the solution.

We are in the process of designing a Newletter for Kids. This newsletter will include topics that they will enjoy and can learn from as well as some fun stuff.

Our Adoption Coordinator is well-known and well respected and our Rescue and Adoption program is top notch. Donna is kept very busy. For now, all of our rescues are housed in foster homes.

We hope you enjoy our first newsletter.

HAPPY ENDING

Around 6pm, on 8/20/08, Donna Prime, one of the volunteer for Wags to Riches Animal Rescue, took a call from the Washington State Troopers dispatch stating that there had been an accident on White Pass and there were animals involved.

Roger Vandiver (Wags' Board Chair) contacted the State Patrol and was told the location of the accident. He and his wife Bev left immediately for White Pass. When they arrived at the scene they could see where a big full sized 4 door truck had left the road, rolled, hit two large trees and then continued to roll and roll. It was crushed like a tin can. In addition to the woman driving, there were 7 small dogs in the back seat on a blanket. The woman was transported by ambulance to Regional Hospital in Yakima, while Roger and his wife proceeded to collect 6 of the 7 dogs. One had escaped. It was seen by an officer, running from the accident. Roger and Bev briefly looked for the missing dog, but felt that since they had injured animals they needed to get them seen by a Vet as soon as possible.



Dr. Kegley of Tieton Drive Animal Clinic agreed to meet Roger at the clinic and check the 6 animals. 2 needed further attention. Volunteer Bob Chism met Roger and Bev at the clinic and took the other 4 home with him. We got an update from Bob via email at 1:19am stating that he and the accident victim's husband went back up to the scene and searched for the seventh dog, Crumb, but had no luck.

Volunteers from Wags to Riches made several more trips over the next few days trying to find Crumb.

UPDATE ON CRUMB AND SUSAN

It took a lot of people getting involved (rafters, people driving by and stopping and saying they saw her running beside the road, Forest Service and WAGS, but WE did it. More than a week later CRUMB IS SAFE AND BACK HOME.

DOG THROWN FROM VEHICLE

Bob, Jennifer, my Husband Chris and I met at Slims in Naches on Sunday 9/21/08. 5 days after a horrible accident where a 10 year old Akita mix dog was thrown from a car during the accident. Bob had been to the scene the day before and didn't hold out much hope.......BUT.....

I am HAPPY to report that we found Copper probably within 20 minutes of beginning our search. Jennifer and I heard him start to bark and we were running (if you could call it running) through the dense brush and trees toward him. We caught sight of him and he looked to be okay. Bob was coming in from the opposite side and Copper got up and headed toward Bob, but decided against it. He was scared so Jennifer and I just stayed with him while Bob went and got the owners. In the meantime, Chris worked on clearing a path for Copper to get out. Bob returned with the owners Chad and Andrea (Chad with his 3 broken ribs and Andrea with her neck brace, two broken vertabrae and black eye) stood at the top of the embankment and with lots of encouragement from all of us Copper was able to claw and paw his way up the mountain.....as were we (no easy task).

Andrea called us Angels...... We all felt BLESSED to have been a part of this amazing rescue. :o)

"HAIR CLUB OF YAKIMA"

Wags to Riches has embarked on a new project. We are currently working with Dr. Ron Worle from the Puget Sound area to collect Dog, Cat and Horse hair that is then used to produce **anti-allergy products** by FDA approved companies.

A lot goes into this very regulated and extremely important prolonged process. It is a great way to recycle and more importantly to help people who are allergic to pets. The end product is shipped to doctors around the world. There are several requirements that we are mandated to meet.

1. Hair must be dirty, meaning collected prior to bathing.

- 2. No purebred Poodle hair. Poodle cross is okay.
- 3. Cat and dog hair must be kept separate.
- 4. All dog hair can be placed in one garbage bag.
- 5. All cat hair can be place in one garbage bag.
- 6. All horse hair can be placed in one garbage bag.

If you are a groomer or have several animals please contact us for more information. We will come visit you. We hope to collect several hundred pounds each collection period.

All of the money raised goes towards the programs and services of Wags to Riches. We have no paid staff, we are all volunteers.

We will be moving forward, very quickly, to start securing funding for the Sanctuary property and buildings.

Within the next few months we will be establishing a resource center of information, resources and contacts for other Rescues organizations, information for the media and information for the general public.

We plan to continue working with Dr. Worle to help him in his efforts to assist with the development of Anti-Allergy products.

We plan to partner with the American Red Cross on a Pet First Aid class. Instructors from the Yakima Chapter of the American Red Cross teach Pet First Aid/CPR, which is the immediate and temporary care given to an injured animal until it can be taken to a professional veterinarian for more definite medical care and attention.

We have over 30 active volunteers who are excited to be a part of this new Rescue, who are dedicated to the cause and who will work hard and smart to meet and exceed the goals we all put together and to help us create new goals.

THANK YOU to our community for answering the call of dog food, blankets, towels, money and so much more right after the raid of the Puppy Mill in Lind, WA. in which 111 dogs were rescued. Thanks to your generosity, volunteers from Wags to Riches was able to make two trips to Othello with much needed supplies. On August 13th we were notified that the owner had 5 days to come up with \$67,500.00 cash bond just for the appeal.

Since that date, all of the survivors have been either spayed or neutered, except for the pregnant females and the new Mama's. They will be spayed before they are adopted out.

In addition, many of them have been adopted and are finally in loving, care homes. One of our volunteers that lives in that area was able to adopt one of the older dogs.

This was a victory for us all.
