EXCITING NEWS.....

Very special volunteers of Wags to Riches and very special friends of the animals have spent hundreds of hours collaborating with Wags volunteers and other organizations, designing and redesigning what could become the largest animal rescue and sanctuary in the Northwest.

Mark and Anita Adolf unveiled plans, at the Wags to Riches General Meeting on September 21st, for the 60 acre facility that will accommodate most types of animals including dogs, cats, horses, bunnies, pigs, etc. and will help pull together different groups to help save more animals.

"There's a need for us all to unite because we need a sanctuary for the dogs and cats and the horses that are not adoptable but still give them a good life", says Mark Adolf, one of the sanctuary's designers.

There will also be an Education Resource Center, training facilities, an R & D Center, cremation facility, a public dog park and a pet cemetery. Also included in the plans is a Cafe, hospitality cabins, RV parking, Sanctuary store, meeting rooms, Caretaker residence, organic greenhouse, large and small animal receiving, assessment and quarantine areas and an Animal CSI/Prosecution & ACN Prevention Building (Abuse, Cruelty and Neglect) and more.

The design allows for development in phases and expansion based on need. It is also modular so it can be adapted to different sites and can be duplicated by others across the USA and around the world.

Mark has been working with Best Friends Animal Society, the largest animal rescue in the United States and they have provided a lot of information, suggestions and ideas. They are very excited about this project. Mark and Anita will be meeting with several of the founders of Best Friends in November.

The new facility will serves as many as 700 each of dogs and cats, and 100 horses. It is still in the planning stages and is in need of funding.

EDUCATION PROGRAM GEARING UP FOR 3RD YEAR IN SCHOOLS

Our program, The 3 "R's" of Wags...Respect, Responsibility and Rescue is in its 3rd year and each year we expand to other schools.

HALLOWEEN IS COMING SOON

Just a reminder to keep all candy out of reach from your pet. While the sweets might taste good to your pet, candy can be harmful to them.. Candy wrappers can be harmful too.

Keep your pet away from Trick-or-Treaters and other Halloween activity. Animals are creatures of habit and may become frightened by the noise and costumed

people. Also frequently opening the door gives them the opportunity to escape unnoticed. Make sure that your pet is wearing a collar and tag.



Cats, particularly black cats, often fall victim to pranksters. It is a good idea to keep all of your cats indoors and out of harms way.

Be careful where you place lighted decorations. Animals are curious and can get burned by the flames. Any unattended decoration can get knocked over and could start a fire that could have disastrous results.

If you decide to dress up your pet for Halloween make sure that the costume doesn't constrain their ability to move, see or hear. Check the costume for parts your pet could chew off and choke on and look for dangling pieces like flowing capes that could injure them.

LOVE LETTERS TO WAGS....




SADIE

I just really wanted to thank all of you, her foster family, all the volunteers that helped answer my questions and everyone that I met along the way. I had never adopted a dog through a rescue, humane society or other and had not completely known what to expect, her adoption was very smooth and we couldn't be happier! - S.G. & Family

I just wanted to send a quick note letting you know how Comet is doing. She is a sweetheart and we are having so much fun with her. We have renamed her Nora and she is starting to learn her name. She is so well housetrained so that has not been an issue. She is getting better at the leash. Going on walks seems to be a favorite activity. She and our other dog, Wyatt, are getting to know each other. He is very sweet and large. She made him nervous

when she first came because she snapped at him when he nosed her. He won't make that mistake again! She set her boundaries firmly. They are beginning to play together and he is so gentle with her it makes my heart melt. His excited play bark is so loud I thought she might be intimidated but I think she gets it. Our only challenge is teaching her to stay off of the carpet and not jump onto furniture. I know this will take some time because right now she has no idea what I am talking about. She also ate a starfish we neglected to doggie proof. I am sure she might get my husband's shoes also as he forgets to pick them up all the time! When Wyatt was a pup he never ate shoes, socks, starfish, etc. So we are a bit lazy at that. He ate couches, ottomans, armoires, and rugs. It was harder to put those away!

Anyway, she is a wonderful fit for our family and we are really happy to have her. She is quite the snuggler. P.G.

I have a moment to update you on Riley while the kids are outside helping her to dig a hole in the ground. Good thing there are mostly weeds in the back yard. It has been a very busy week for all of us. We have renamed Riley to Becca and she responds to her new name now. We like Riley but our neighbor had just lost her dog of 13 years that had been

named Riley.



I have spent the last week getting up to speed on how to not act like a prey. Becca is quickly learning that I am not going to be one of her prey but the kids are taking a little longer to learn how to act like a tree. Potty training and crating are going well with Becca. I get up in the night and take her out. Becca is sleeping in Haley's room and starts the night in the crate just to get her to calm down, then sometimes she will sleep loose in the dog house bottom instead with her confined to the room.

Becca is alarm barking just the right amount so far. She wants to chew up certain things with a vengeance so we have brought some things into the house for her to have so she stays away from shoes, furniture and clothes. The kids are trying to keep the floors clean of things not good for the dog but they forget sometimes. Becca likes to play tug of war with an old rope piece, we found a squeaky toy for her and sometimes she will play fetch with the ball. The cats have let her know that they are not interested in playing with her and so far Becca has agreed with their wishes. Becca does seem to enjoy the water. Thats all for now. Liz.

BALTO- WAGS VERY SPECIAL LOVE STORY TO HIM

Marci received a call from a man who wanted us to take his dog because he was relocating. As Marci questioned him, he began to reveal that he had owned Balto since he was a puppy, but the dog had recently suffered heat stroke. It would seem Balto's owner had purchased a new home and did not want dog hair in it. Consequently Balto was left tied to a tree in the 90 degree summer heat at the old residence, where he was only visited every other day. His owner seemed unalarmed and indeed, unashamed of this but did want us to take the dog so he would not have to deal with hair. During the conversation, Marci also learned that Balto was fourteen and a coyote hybrid.

What could we do? We told him to bring him in. Balto arrived displaying a head tilt and raspy breathing. We were told, the head tilt came from a chronic inner ear infection that he had taken him to the vet for "on many occasions" and as for the breathing we were told, "Oh, he's always done that".

Balto was signed over to us and his owner left without so much as a backwards glance. Fourteen years with this dog, and not so much as a good-bye. It was as if he felt unburdened and indeed Balto did not seem to notice his departure either. It was if he knew this might be a better place to live. Calls to Balto's Vet revealed a most disturbing pattern. Yes, the vet has seen Balto on numerous occasions over his lifetime, for inner ear infections, but could never convince his owner to take home medication for it. He didn't want to pay for it or be burdened with administering it. So the infection raged on until it destroyed his inner ear leaving him with permanent balance issues, partial loss of hearing and a head tilt. When the vet saw Balto for the heat stroke, he asked that Balto be left at the clinic for at least a three days for rehydration therapy via IV treatment, but his owner refused saying he was bringing him to us. Not surprisingly, Balto was not up to date on vaccinations either.



When we got Balto, he walked in calmly sans leash, dutifully behind his owner, who hauled him in the BACK of his truck, and proceeded to capture our hearts. We had him examined by Tieton Drive Animal Clinic and they found his inner ear infection had spun itself out, but not without permanent damage. They felt his breathing was a combination of damage caused by the untreated ear infection, the untreated heat stroke and a life time of poor care. His trachea valves did not close off properly, causing the inability to fully expel or inhale air from the lungs. Sort of like Asthma.

Prednisone proved to give Balto a few weeks of relief before he took his final turn for the worse. In those couple of weeks, he was treated like a King and shown more love than he probably experienced his entire life. He spent time with volunteers, under the ARC shade trees, hearing loving endearments and feeling kind and caring hands. He loved his treats, his raw hide chews, his twice daily outings and his cool, clean kennel with constantly available fresh cold water. He also, loved everyone he met.

When Balto took a turn for the worse arrangements were made to take him in immediately. Jenifer spent a few moments with Balto in his kennel, comforting him and letting him know, just how loved he had become by us all. She turned the AC on in her car and let it cool down, then picked him up, carried him out and placed him in the backseat of her car on a soft clean blanket. He was gone before her arrival at the clinic.

To me Balto's story is far sadder yet far more inspiring, than those of the young dogs who have experienced bouts of neglect and abuse and take months to overcome it. Balto endured a lifetime of indifference and neglect, and never once held it against us as a race. He was a true embassador for the canine ability to forgive and persevere. Balto is a shining example of why we all do what we do. His gentle nature, which persevered through much neglect and shined like a beacon, under the loving care of all who tended him at the center, is a testement to the forgiving nature of rescue dogs everywhere, We can find some peace, in knowing that Balto felt very special and much loved, in the last few weeks of his precious existence.
